

What Makes the Catholic bible different from most protestant bibles, and why?

- The deuterocanonical books, termed apocrypha by Protestants, remain included in Bibles between Old and New Testaments with a disclaimer statement that they are not inspired writings.
- Early 17th century English Protestants separated from the Church of England began excluding the deuterocanonical books from their Bibles entirely.
- Most protestant Bibles from early 19th century to present have no deuterocanonical books included in their content.
